June 21, 2020 The assigned reading are Jeremiah 20:1-13, Psalm 91:1-10 (11-16), Romans 6:12-23, Matthew 10:5a, 21-22

Dear Friends at Bethlehem,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ!

Today's readings are rather dreary, except Psalm 91. Jeremiah prophesies that the people of God will be sent into exile from their homeland and spend years in captivity in Babylon – they would be aliens in a foreign land. That is why we are called to take care of foreigners, as well as widows and children, because our history includes times when the chosen people were foreigners, immigrants, aliens displaced from our homeland.

In Matthew, Jesus tells the disciples of the rejection they will receive from many because they teach in his name. Jesus' words will bring havoc to families because some will cling to the traditions and rules they have learned about religion, while others will embrace the love and forgiveness that Jesus teaches as the way to be faithful to God.

How easy it is to forget that Jesus was understood to be a rebel by the church of his time. His followers were considered "radical" because they broke the old rules in favor of Jesus' ways. Jesus did not honey-coat the truth that the Messiah would not only bring salvation, but also discord. I would rather that this change to the world would have come peacefully, but it didn't and Jesus was honest with his disciples about what they were getting into.

In Romans, Paul is addressing a whole different set of people – Gentile Christians. Not those who were Jewish through their ancestry and had come to believe that Jesus was the Messiah, but those of different backgrounds who had come to believe in Jesus. In ever-widening circles the Church was growing. Paul wrote of the call to follow Jesus and be obedient to Christian practices, but not out of fear. Sin could be forgiven, but embracing the call to love our neighbors as ourselves was the way to a better life.

The melody of "On Eagle's Wings" sings through my mind as I read Psalm 91; the verses of that hymn are based on this Psalm. The chorus is based on an image from Deuteronomy 32:11, "As an eagle stirs up its nest, and hovers over its young; as it spreads its wings, takes them up, and bears them aloft on its pinions..." Although the eagles we know do not teach their young to fly by allowing them to rest on their backs, it is a powerful image of God carrying us through hard times as we grow stronger, just as God carried the Israelites through the wilderness by providing manna, water, and quail. Psalm 91 speaks of God as a shelter — a refuge, a fortress, a shield, covering us with his wings to protect us, sending angels to guard our ways. Of course, the threats to life still come — wars, diseases, accidents, wild animals. Yet through it all, God protects God's people. God will never leave us alone. As Paul wrote in Romans, that does not give us license to do whatever we want. We are to be followers of this God in whom we trust — loving God with all our hearts, minds, souls, and strength and our neighbors as ourselves (the compact version of the Ten Commandments).

The coronavirus is the current plague that threatens world health, and God is with us as we face the dangers to our communities. The government may not be holding daily news briefings anymore, taking the virus from the forefront of our minds, but it is far from done. We should still social distance and wear masks to protect our neighbors and ourselves. Our denomination (ELCA) reminds us that for now, we are not to gather for congregational worship, because it puts communities in danger of Covid-19

spread. I trust that God is working through <u>all</u> the scientists who are working to develop a vaccine. No matter their religion or what country they live in, God can use them for his purposes.

There are many other issues our country is facing right now. It can be overwhelming, but let us do what we can to be God's instruments of healing and peace.
