The Time of Easter invites us into the story of Jesus' sacrificial death and His glorious resurrection. The resurrection of Jesus gives proof that our salvation has been completed and that our hope for eternal life with God is secure.

Easter was the major celebration of the Early Church, which also set aside a period of preparation to celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection of Our Lord (Easter). Lent was a period of preparation first prescribed for baptismal candidates. During this period, the candidates were examined in preparation for Baptism at the Easter (or Paschal) Vigil. Later, these forty days were associated with Jesus' forty days in the desert prior to His temptation (Matthew 4:1-11) and with the forty years the children of Israel spent in the wilderness (Numbers 14:34), becoming a period of preparation for every Christian.

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The Sundays during this season are not "of Lent" but "**in** Lent". Thus the Sundays retain an Easter tone and may be less solemn than the midweek services that we offer. The observances of Lent are concrete reminders of the greater solemnity of this season, yet Lutherans emphasize the **Gospel of Christ as central** even to this penitential season.

The week before Easter is called **Holy Week**. Our Lenten preparation and repentance deepens as we focus on the events of Jesus' life from His entrance into Jerusalem until His death on the cross and burial in the garden tomb.

Palm Sunday, the first day of Holy Week, commemorates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem (Matthew 21:1-11). Because the complete account of the Lord's Passion from Matthew, Mark, or Luke is often read, this Sunday is also called the **Sunday of the Passion**.

On **Holy (Maundy) Thursday**, the Church gives thanks to Jesus for the institution of **His Supper**. This is a feast day, and the color used to decorate the church is white. The Holy

and beaten before His crucifixion.

Good Friday is the most solemn of all days in the Christian Church; yet a note of joy remains, as the title of the day indicates. On Good Friday, as we remember that on account of our sin the Lord was crucified and died, we give joyful thanks to God that all sin and God's wrath over sin fall on Jesus and not on us, and that by His grace we receive the benefit of this most sacrificial act.

Easter is not merely a one-day celebration: it is a fiftyday season from the Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord to the Day of Pentecost. This extended season – one seventh of the year – is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior.

The First celebration of Easter is the **Easter Vigil**, the evening of Holy Saturday. The Vigil includes light, in which fire symbolizes Jesus as the light of the world. This day we Christians go from **the solemnity of Good Friday to the predawn joy of Easter**.

Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Some may hold a sunrise service, commemorating the surprise of the women visiting the empty tomb of Christ.

Here at Bethlehem we hold a service that celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Sunday morning. We continue this joyous and celebratory tone as it echoes down through the Sundays of the Easter season.



Title: A Transformational Journey: A systems approach to addiction and related mental health issues

Description: Permission to openly discuss addiction and related mental health issues, without automatic judgments, is a hallmark of a healthy and healing congregation. Conversations about these issues are often rare and uncomfortable in many congregations. Though one family in three has direct experience with someone with an addiction experience, the subject is seldom raised. The opportunity to impact someone struggling with addiction and related mental health issues are often no farther away than the person sitting near us on Sunday morning—someone whose life is silently unraveling and who desperately needs someone to reach out with an open heart.

Informed clergy, supported by committed and trained lay leaders can serve their congregation by starting the conversation about substance use disorders, other addictions, and related mental health issues. They can offer hope to those who suffer through a recovery support ministry and help to those who want to prevent problems through awareness, education, and early intervention strategies. This transformational journey is both personal as well as systemic. This webinar will explore the dynamics of addiction on an individual, family, congregation, and community basis as well as a systemic response to these issues.

Speaker: Drew Brooks has been the Executive Director of Faith Partners since 2011, a non-profit organization established in 1995 providing leadership, training, and consultation to educate clergy and help develop congregational prevention and recovery support team ministries. He has worked in the prevention, treatment, and public health fields for over 40 years providing training and consultation nationally. He has helped author four curricula and has served on a number of organizational boards and advisory councils.
